Rod said "Act for Autism is a small S.A. based group that is very worthy of the support of all South Australians, which



Auctioneers Compliance Workshop – Coonawarra

Society Accredited Trainers Brett Roenfeldt and Garry Topp headed for the South East on Wednesday 20th August for Real Estate Auctioneering Compliance Training as part of a program of Workshops to give Auctioneers the necessary qualifications to register under the new Real Estate Industry Reform Act. To be compliant under the new Act, proof of attainment of PRDRE26A, Conduct Sale by Public Auction, a unit of PRDRE40101, Certificate IV in Property (Real Estate) is required. For Auctioneers without a statement of attainment, the Society convened a one day workshop jointly with REISA on 21st August 2008 at Coonawarra and 29th August and 17th September at REISA. It is our understanding that all Auctioneers who have not completed the two day Auction School or Certificate IV in the last two years will need to have attended!

For Auctioneers who have completed the Society's two day Auction School in the last eighteen months, and who wish to register as an Auctioneer, you will be sent a Course Enrolment Form (Page 2 is not required and no fees are payable) to complete which then needs to be sent back with a signed copy of your Auction script which must be compliant with the new Act. Auctioneers must also confirm the dates of attendance at the two day School. Once received, the information will be submitted to the R.T.O. and when assessed as compliant a Certificate of Attainment will be forwarded. ●

House Prices Recover in New Zealand Market

thought it was time to put some brief thoughts to paper before I toddle off for a mid year break. As I write this, signs are emerging that we may be well through our winter of discontent.

While sales numbers are at a five or six year low, sales are occurring at steady levels and despite constant media talk of a crashing and collapsing market, in many cases homes are selling for above prices that were paid in the last year or two, just as some are selling below while others are selling at about 'money back'. Growth has slowed but prices are flat but steady.

Figures released in August by Quotable Value NZ suggest that Christchurch prices have slipped 2% in the last 12 months. Now that really is a blip on the radar.

Then during this week REINZ figures for July were released showing an "unexpected recovery" for the housing market, apart from Auckland.

Auckland has historically experienced

far wilder swings and fluctuations than the rest of the country with higher growth in boom times but bigger falls in harder markets, so once again this appears normal for the type of markets we are presently experiencing.

Yes, owners do have to be sharp with their pricing or buyers are voting with their feet and staying away.

I have in my possession a copy of last week's *Melbourne Age* weekly auction report which notes that "the markets erratic course continued with some homes struggling and others attracting good interest."

Alistair Craig, Director of leading Melbourne Agents Jellis Craig said "Buyers are becoming increasingly discerning about price". "If vendors are above the market their properties are being passed in."

Sounds like a mirror image of New Zealand to me. So in my humble opinion it's not all bad out there and there are some signs that we may be moving out of the doldrums. These include:

SPRING IS COMING

Every year we see a traditional lift after winter and this year is no different. The last two months have seen a small lift in sales numbers after bottoming out in May. This appears to be continuing for August.

OFFICIAL CASH RATE DROPPED

There was good news last month when the Official Cash Rate was reduced for the first time in several years. Most commentators are predicting further drops until Christmas.

MANY BUYERS ARE PRE-QUALIFIED

Our mortgage brokers report that there are a large number of pre-qualified buyers out there ready to move on the right property when it comes along. They report very strong enquiry from those wishing to get qualified in advance.

REAL ESTATE WEBSITE HITS ARE INCREASING

Forthefirsttimethisyear**www.realestate.co.nz** as well as others reported an increase in web traffic in July. Prior to this every month of the 2008 year had seen a successive drop off each month.●

How the Wheel Turns

Whith the new Legislation and particularly, the registration of Auctioneers it makes me smile how views and methods change with the passing of time'. So says Christopher McLaughlin, Life Member and third President of the Society (1984-1987).

He remembers vividly how the Government of the time deregulated the Profession, and, recommended that we form our own Society to establish a high level of expertise. He refers to a portion of his President's report in Volume 1, No. 6 of The Auctioneer and Appraiser. Quotation - 'Towards the end of 1981, the General Manager of the Real Estate Institute of South Australia Incorporated, Mr Colin Spry, wrote that sweeping changes were to be made for then currently licensed Appraisers and Auctioneers. The Government thought fit that such persons establish a self regulated body, to replace the licencing procedure. With the assistance of the Real Estate Institute, a

Society for persons interested either in the appraisal of chattels and real property or the auction of chattels, real property, livestock and other goods, was formed to be known as the Society of Auctioneers and Appraisers (SA) Incorporated.

And now with the new regulations, Auctioneers must once again be registered. Sometimes it has appeared that anybody could become an Auctioneer – however, the standard generally did appear to be at a high level.

It must also be minuted that the recently voluntarily adopted practices by the Auctioneering Profession of the conduct of Auctions eg.(a) registration of bidders and (b) declaration of vendor bidding, has worked particularly well with the **public embracing the transparency**.

The addition now required by the Government of Auctioneers being required to call at each bid the number of the bidder seems totally unecessary and detrimental especially where there are various bidders bidding quickly.

Christopher McLaughlin does refer to a portion of a paper on 'A generational challenge to repower America' that

he does feel is applicable in considering regulations – 'In such moments, we are called upon to move quickly and boldly to shake off complacency, throw aside old habits and rise, clear-eyed and alert, to the necessity of big changes. Those who, for whatever reason, refuse to do their part must either be persuaded to join the effort or asked to step aside. This is such a moment.'
